Community Superintendent Report: Dr. Tamra Collins reported on the following:

District 19 Data - Middle of the Year Data Report

Goal 1: All students learn to read well. D19 students will learn to read through the continued implementation of the Fundations curriculum and research-based Tier II interventions resulting in a growth of 10 percentage points from 44.6% to 54.6% on the Acadience Reading Screener.

Edmentum Program:

We are excited to share our District Sprint Plan which is part of our overall plan to accelerate learning! Teachers use the Knowledge Map to identify skills students need to practice.

WIN (What I Need) Rotations:

- o Edmentum Exact Path (Personalized Learning Path ~ 40 minutes a week)
- Teacher-Led (Standards Instruction)
- Standards Mastery (Standards Practice ~ 30-40 minutes a week)

Students will build and strengthen their foundational skills while accelerating their learning by mastering grade-level standards supported by teacher data analysis.

Goal 3: All students will have a high-quality academic experience.

District 19 will ensure high quality core instruction focused on problem solving and content knowledge in mathematics resulting in a 10-percentage point increase in proficiency on the NYS Math Assessment from 42.7% to 52.7%.

Goal 2: All students will be physically and emotionally safe.

The number of suspensions in Middle Schools evidenced in OORS will be reduced by 5 percentage points from 281 to 276 through the implementation of Restorative approaches and individual support plans.



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Action Steps & Activities:

- Restorative justice professional development and coaching from OSYD, Ramapo and Morningside to middle schools
- TCIS training for school staff to aid in de-escalation and conflict mediation
- Expanded individual plans for students with multiple disciplinary incidents to include intentional SEL support, mentorship, and behavior coaching.
- SEL classroom protocol to ensure community and building relationships
- RFA Liaisons leading SEL sessions with students
- CREW and RJ lessons being implemented in Advisory
- Family sessions with Morningside
